## ***St. Anthony Scrip program pays off***

Scrip is a non-selling fundraising program that benefits both families and our parish. It has been in existence at St. Anthony's for many years.

Scrip is just another way to pay for everyday purchases using gift cards instead of cash, check or credit cards. Families purchase gift cards at face value, and our Scrip Program orders those cards from Great Lakes Scrip Center at a reduced price.

The difference is an instant rebate for our Scrip Program: 75 percent of the rebate goes back to families in the form of tuition credit; and 25 percent goes to the Scrip Program. The Scrip Program in turn donates its earnings to our parish.

Families have the choice of using the credit to go toward their own child's tuition or that of a relative or friend. Families can also recruit others to support them by using Scrip.

In 2015, families earned a total of \$23,430 of Holy Family tuition credit and \$1,690 of Religious Education tuition credit.

Families can also bank the tuition credit for future use by their very young children, grandchildren or future babies. In 2015 the Scrip Program banked a total of \$1,656 for this purpose.

Recently the Scrip Program donated \$25,000 to the Parish, which was used to support the summer renovation of Our Lady of Guadalupe. This renovation included remodeling of the preschool area; remodeling of restrooms on two floors of the building; new flooring, paint, security doors, and 8 replacement windows. The total cost of the project was \$50,000. Holy

# St. Anthony's singing out

*Nicole Soer is the music coordinator at St. Anthony Parish and offers the following thoughts on our parish's music in praise and worship.*

"St. Anthony's is blessed with an incredible singing parish as well as talented musicians who volunteer their time and talent.

A quote from the USCCB's guidelines, Sing to the Lord: Music in Divine Worship, sums up our liturgical role beautifully:

"Choir members, like all liturgical ministers, should exercise their ministry with evident faith and should participate in the entire liturgical celebration, recognizing that they are servants of the Liturgy and members of the gathered assembly."

How can we as musicians do this?

- Continue to encourage our congregation's participation by mindfully inviting everyone to sing, thoughtfully choosing music that most of the congregation knows, and intentionally teaching new music to expand our parish's repertoire
- Recruit and welcome strong musicians dedicated to fostering excellence in musical liturgy
- Develop and grow as musicians by practicing regularly, joining community groups (such as the Dubuque Chorale or the Archdiocesan Choir), taking lessons, listening to excellent renditions of our common liturgical songs, recording our own masses and listening with a critical ear, etc.

As musicians, we have focused on blending voices within our small groups, intentionally introducing new music (including the Mass of Renewal), and welcoming new musicians.

We have also brought back and reinvigorated the adult choir. During practice, we focus on a musical skill each week such as phrasing, musical expression, dynamics, breathing and choose songs that help us practice these skills.

One tool that has been incredibly helpful is YouTube because most of the songs we sing have recordings posted there! This has helped us in both practicing and learning music.

Our choir numbers are usually around 11 or 12 members with 18 different people having been a part of the choir. We come from a variety of musical backgrounds and have a nice range of ages as well as a good balance of sopranos, altos, tenors and basses. Palm Sunday was especially striking to me as we sang "Were You There" because I was enveloped in beautiful sound from both the congregation and the choir.

We would love to have you join us in the choir! If you are not sure about committing to practicing and singing every other week, perhaps you would be interested in our summer choir. We will sing just three or four times in the summer and will practice about 50 minutes prior to mass. This will be a great way to get your feet wet without a huge time commitment!

I feel blessed to have been part of this ministry for more than 20 years here and would like to share a little about myself.

## St. Anthony, Nativity to collaborate on religious education

In the 2016-2017 school year, St. Anthony Parish and Nativity Parish will collaborate to provide one Religious Education program to both parishes. Sessions will still be held at St. Anthony's with the exception of occasional evenings, such as Ash Wednesday liturgy or the Communal Reconciliation service, being held at Nativity.

There will be St. Anthony's and Nativity catechists and aides and St. Anthony's Coordinator of Religious Education, Stephanie Klapatauskas and St. Anthony's Youth Formation Coordinator, Dave McDermott will oversee the Religious Education program.

This is an effort to better use both parishes' resources as there has been a decline in the number of students in Nativity's Religious Education program over the years.

We believe this collaboration will be beneficial to both parishes.

The Sacramental preparation for students in second grade and those students preparing for Confirmation will also be combined with students still typically receiving the Sacraments in their own parishes.

It must be noted this decision was not made with any thought toward combining the parishes in any other manner beyond what is deemed as the best use of our resources.

We are simply trying to be good stewards of the resources we have at both parishes, and we are very excited to be working with Nativity toward our shared goal of providing a high quality Religious Education program and formational experience for the children and youth of both St. Anthony's and Nativity.

## How you can extend mercy

Pope Francis has designated a year of Mercy for the Church. It started on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, Dec. 8, 2015, and will end in

November 2016 on the Solemnity of Christ the King.

We are asked to celebrate the Year of Mercy by showing to others the mercy that God extends to all of us.

The Archdiocese and the parish are involved in various projects and activities, but here are a few ways we can personally get involved in the celebration of mercy.

1. By being aware of the reality of mercy, we begin to see how God gives himself to us and asks nothing in return. Because we are touched by God's mercy, we can show mercy to others.
2. No one can see what's going on in someone's life. There may be things going on that we're not aware of. Refraining from judgment is itself an act of mercy because it allows us to accept the good in every person. Being patient with the shortcomings of others is also an act of mercy.
3. Jesus asks us to forgive in the way we have received forgiveness from God. When we forgive, we are released from the resentment that can affect our lives and relationships. Forgiveness is an act of mercy toward ourselves and others.
4. In the Archdiocese of Dubuque, there is a "holy door" entrance at St. Raphael Cathedral. (If you're looking toward the sanctuary in the Cathedral, the "holy door" is toward the right, near the baptismal font.) The purpose of the holy door pilgrimage is symbolic of the desire we have to live more fully in conformity to the pastoral charity of Jesus.
